

NEWS FROM YOUR CHURCH

Well hello to you all!

It has been over a year since we last published a Bethel Mag, and it has really been quite a year in the making. We have all been through the most difficult of times and it seems that just as we are passing through maybe the last of the worst of COVID, we have now moved into an awful situation with the war in Ukraine.

War against a virus has given way to war against aggression and violence, and here so many thousands of miles away, we might feel that we are helpless in how to stop this evil. However, we can give of our resources to help fund help for the Ukrainian people and we can pray for their safety and for a quick and trustworthy solution to the horrendous situations.

When our world seems to be lurching from crisis to crisis, we can be faced with the real possibility of thinking and saying that we just can't do this any more - time to give up - but this is the opposite of how we are called to be in this world. God knew and knows that our world is spoiled, tainted by sadness and dying and death, bereavement and hurt and pain. He chooses to speak to us through His word and to give us what we need to keep on keeping on.

In the New Testament, in a letter written by Paul to the Churches in Galatia (modern day Turkey) Paul writes these words - "So let us not grow weary in doing what is good; for if we don't give up, we will, in due time, reap the harvest." Hold that thought for a moment, and go with me to the Old Testament and the book of Esther. A man called Mordecai discovers a plot against the king. The king was saved and the good, faithful deed was written in the Book of the Chronicles, but Mordecai received nothing by way of thanks or reward, even though Esther had credited him with the discovery to the king. It <u>seemed</u> that the king and even God had forgotten Mordecai's good deed. Maybe the king had forgotten, but God never forgets.

However, God did not reward Mordecai at that time, but He did reserve, purposely saved the reward for the right time. If God delays a reward, it's not because He's forgotten, then suddenly by accident remembers, but because He chooses to bless us in the moments when it would do us the most good.

God keeps His eyes on each and every one of us, watching us love and serve Him. The Hebrew word for 'serve' is ABAD, and it means an act of service that is an act of worship. Anything we do for God is a way of us worshipping Him, and anything we do for others is an act of our worship to God. (Here's a thought then - if we are doing good it's like we are doing good to God, and if we harm people with words or actions, it's like we are harming God!)

So Paul is actually saying to the Galatian Church, "Let's not get tired of worshipping God as we serve Him by serving others, because if we don't give up, God will, at the right time, reward us.

Now we don't do good, we don't serve God to be rewarded, but God cannot be out-given, so when we do good, expand the boundaries of His Kingdom, live the qualities of the fruits of the Spirit (Faithfulness, Self-Control, Patience, Goodness, Gentleness, Joy, Kindness, Peace and Love) God's character CANNOT not reward us. However, it's always in His time.

Hold that thought and come with me back to Esther. If the king had rewarded Mordecai there and then, that would have been it - job done, thank you given, end of story. However Haman was an evil man who hated the Jewish people and he spent his life trying to destroy them. Haman hatched a plot to kill all the Jews and the king agreed, not realising Mordecai was Jewish. Esther stepped in and told the king of Haman's real intent and Haman was punished and Mordecai saved. The king saved Mordecai because while he was mourning the fact he had agreed to Haman's wishes, he had the Book of the Chronicles read to him, and he was reminded that Mordecai had

saved his life. God was working behind the scenes to honour Mordecai and answer the prayers of protection form the Jewish people. God's timing is perfect.

Isaiah 55:8-9 says, "'For my thoughts are not your thoughts and your ways are not my ways' says Adonai." Even when we cannot see the immediate effect of doing good, of keeping God's word, of following His ways - the time will come, at God's right time, when we see the effect, consequence of us remaining faithful to God. Let's make it very clear - salvation is NOTHING to do with the good deeds we have done, are doing or will do. Salvation cannot be bought from God or earned - it's a free gift offered to us by Jesus. When we accept Jesus' gift, it's then that all the good that we do moves from us just doing good, to us doing good as an act of worship, and that gets God involved.

Doing good is not always the easy option, nor is it always the quick option, nor the cheap option, but it's always the right option for those of use who dare to call ourselves Christians. When things keep going wrong, when the world continues to lurch from one bad thing to another, when we feel exhausted, too tired even to cry and we just want to give up and give in, it's then that God's word speaks to us -

Romans 5:18 "This is life, and life is not just about our destination, it's about our journey." Sometimes when we are going through difficult times, it can seem endless, and 'same tat different day' is a common feeling. Actually, although the difficulties are awful, what makes them better or worse is our attitude - some troubles make us or break us, some troubles make us weaker or stronger, some troubles put a wedge between us and God or draw us closer to Him - it's always our choice as to what happens because of the troubles.

Proverbs 24:10 in the Message Bible says, "If you fall to pieces in a crisis, there wasn't much to you in the first place." So, in times of crisis, we need to keep on keeping on. We need to carry on doing good, serving and worshipping Him, because we are NOT just humans - we are children of God. We do not face this world's troubles on our own, and you do not have to battle alone. Not only are we "surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses cheering us on from the stands as we run our race of life" (Hebrews 12), but we are also indwelt by the Holy Spirit. Philippians 4:13 says, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." The same verse translated in the Message Bible says, "Whatever I have, wherever I am, I can make it through anything, in the One who makes me who I am."

Keep on keeping on doing God's works, doing good in this world that is so troubled. Turning away from God means we live in a very imperfect world full of imperfect people, so there will always be something to deal with, always the chance something is coming to hit us from left field that we didn't see coming. We are experiencing evil at work not only in the war in Ukraine, but in the daily war we fight in our own lives - good against evil, light against dark, Satan against God. Our job, in the middle of the troubles is to do good, and to do it again and again, until Jesus comes for us or calls us home, and if we keep on keeping on, He has promised that in His time, we will reap the harvest.

So on the days when we feel our weakness is stronger than our strength - on the days we feel our despair is stronger than our hope - on the days we feel our distress has destroyed our peace, God's word says in Psalm 121 - "If I raise my eyes to the hills, from where will my help come? My help comes from the Lord, the Maker of Heaven and Earth."

John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist Church said this - "Do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the people you can, as long as ever you can."

So especially in these troubled times, let us not grow weary in doing good. As Mother Teresa said "Do good anyway."

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Mud, Mud, Glorious Mud!

Preparation to undertake a 10-mile Tough Mudder Classic requires weeks of scheduling lives around event-specific exercise plans, disciplined nutrition intake, a high-intensity/stamina-building training programme and a great deal of mental focus.

So to increase the enormity of the challenge, we decided to give all of that a swerve, and have a go at it anyway...

On the morning of Saturday August 14, Solvay Oldbury's elite 7-strong

invasion force -

meticulously assembled to achieve the perfect blend of youth, experience and blind optimism - set off under the terrifying moniker of 'Hair Today, Gone Tomorrow' (no further explanation needed, once you see the team photos).



What surely must have

been the most ferocious band of warriors to storm Belvoir Castle since the English Civil War arrived in extremely high spirits. The Gone Tomorrow element of the group were particularly relaxed - probably on the basis that further physical damage to already-creaking joints would be of little consequence. Those still sporting head hair, and with more to lose should their body parts become incapacitated, seemed a little more pensive at this stage.

However, the sense of togetherness nurtured over months of slowly-building determination meant that a backward step would lead to a kangaroo court sentence of far worse consequences than 10 miles of muscle-sapping terrain, 25 obstacles offering various levels of discomfort/strain/pain/embarrassment, and 5 hours with no access to

A motivational warm- up routine, with the emphasis on fun and meeting all challenges as a team, did little to warn of the devilry that we were about to face. An opening obstacle named 'Kiss The Mud' probably conjures up a



realistic image of how this one works ... Skid-marked, Entrapment, Arctic Enema and Pitfall possibly leave a little more to the imagination; whilst Electroshock Therapy was unfortunately precisely as advertised.

Slogging up and down inclines with naturally tricky surfaces prevented any boredom from taking hold in between the 'highs' of the physical assault on mind and body. Any residual fears of what was coming next were allayed by constant support and encouragement from within our band of merry men (mainly expressed via uncontrolled laughter should anyone find themselves in particularly creative difficulties).

After around 3.5 hours of invigorating pursuits, and with the finish line in sight, we approached the final obstacle to hear what appeared to be shrieks of uncontrolled fear, pain and anger. Our football-supporting contingent viewed this as a typical Saturday afternoon out, and as a team we launched into 20m or so of mud, hay bale hurdles and zaps from electrically-charged, hanging strips of hell fire to fall/lurch/crawl to safety and the anticipation of a cleansing jet of cold water and an even colder beer - Job done!

Two things to note -

- (i) hopes that our two Tough Mudder veterans had been exaggerating (even a little) about just how testing this course is, proved to be completely unfounded. If anything, they may have 'accidentally' omitted just one or two details
- (ii) reports from our two Tough Mudder veterans on the sense of achievement to be experienced in completing this course, and the overwhelming feeling of being part of a quite unique team, were also a little understated.

BETHEL from the comfort of your own home!

During the lockdowns we used Zoom to be able to bring church to your homes. However we realised that this was no longer suitable as we prepared to reopen church. To ensure we fulfilled our vision of

"Turning the lost into the found and the faithless into the faithful"

we recognised that we were required to offer both an online and face to face option of church.

Following many hours testing what was possible using zoom we came to the conclusion that this platform no longer suited our needs and that we required a different way to provide the new 'hybrid' style church that was required.

We installed more technology within church ensuring that this was compatible with our current 'sound set up' which we believed would give us many possibilities to provide the platform we required for our Sunday services as well as funerals, weddings, Little Lambs productions and our own kids Nativity of course.

The new technology includes two cameras with multiple settings, the ability to broadcast live on YouTube, the ability to broadcast our projector display (enabling people at home to see the words for worship) and the ability to record the whole service for anyone wishing to watch at a later time or date.

If you attend or want to attend our Sunday services, do not worry about being on camera as the way we record and broadcast only captures those who are on stage or are contributing to the service from the front so it wouldn't record you blowing (or picking) your nose if you had the need to.

and God will delight when we are creators of justice and joy, compassion and peace: yes, God will delight when we are creators of justice, justice and joy!





together, helping each other, and filling the room with joy and laughter.


