Hi People. How lovely to be writing this in the truly melting warmth of the Bethel office. It's 7pm and we still need the fan on!! Summer has come, and it's beautiful. Every season is superb, and even though my most favourite is Autumn, I love all the seasons for their uniqueness and contribution to our earth's loveliness.

Since the last Bethel Mag, we've been through the gloriously inexplicable season of Easter - the Jesus story - the story of God's love invading our world. The Choral Society sang "The Crucifixion" written so many years ago by John Stainer, and the timeless music is a faith-deepener for all who will open their hearts and let Jesus in.

We've also had an event that for many of us is once in a lifetime - the coronation of a new monarch.

The performers and the audience had a most enjoyable evening - so why not come along next year (in either capacity)?




It's gotta be - Roxy!



Bella was introduced to the Bethel Family WhatsApp group by Clare, as she used to live near to her previous owner, who unfortunately was taken into hospital for end-of-life care and passed away earlier this year. Clare was therefore desperately looking for a home for Bella, who had been left alone in her home, with daily visits from Clare and her family to look after her. They had been told that Bella didn't like other dogs (and Roxy is also not over keen on her!) and didn't like going out for walks - and another problem was she is extremely overweight, as she was previously fed on whatever her bed-bound owner was eating.



Without a new home to go to, Bella was in danger of having to be put to sleep. However, having tried to find a home for her under these conditions and not having much luck on social media and amongst friends, Clare took her out for a walk, and found that although it was hard going for her, she loved it! She also found that she wasn't too bothered by the other dogs they came across on their walks, so at last there was a spark of hope there.



So, someone from church is a sucker for dogs and cats in need of a new home! Having lost all but one of our previous dogs over the years, the most recent being just before Christmas, there was a big dog shaped hole needing to be filled. We took little Max (a miniature Jack Russell) along to meet Bella on Palm Sunday this year, and they seemed to get on - so the following day Bella came to her new furever home - and she has been an absolute delight.

We were very worried in the early days as we didn't know much about her, and what we found out was previous vets suspected she had a tumour and weren't that optimistic about her health. However, on taking her to our vets, dreading what they might say, there were no tumours detected, although she was over twice the weight she should be - 65kg instead of 30kg! Through her microchip we also found that she was only just over 7, not over 10 as previous vets had said, that she had spent time in the pound in Stoke, she's obviously had quite a few litters of puppies and that her previous owners had rescued her too. And she's a Rhodesian Ridgeback.

She's settled in to her new home so well, she plays so gently with her little brother and they love each other to bits - they both stress when they are not together. She loves to be outside in the garden, to have her tummy rubbed and loves her sleep - taking up most of the bed and having to be coaxed downstairs in a morning.

She's a big snorer too, and has to have pillows under her to help her breathe better at night. She's eating proper dog food now at regular intervals and is already looking in better shape, though still a long way to go. The pain she was in with the arthritis in her joints is getting easier, she can now get up and downstairs so much better, and just needs her ramp to get in and out of the car! She loves to go for a short walk, stands begging at the door when she wants to go, and comes to pick me up from work a couple of times a week when I'm walking in. She has also developed a passion for balls and cuddly toys - but she loves to de-stuff them, so is getting through a fair amount.

We are so blessed to be Bella's new furever pawrents, she really is a golden girl who deserves a chance to be happy for the rest of her days.

Bethel Memories

Whatever your feelings about the monarchy, 2023 is an historic year. I think this year's coronation was the fifth in the history of Bethel. There is no indication in the archives of how or indeed if, Bethelites marked each of these occasions. The AGM dated January 1937 records Mr Sidney Wooldridge addressing the meeting and referring to the 'stormy times' the country had experienced in 1936. I suspect that he was including the abdication crisis in his summary. Edward's brother George, father of our late Queen was crowned in May 1937 but the Management Committee minutes indicate that repaying some of the debt on the chapel was uppermost in Bethel's thoughts at that time. Queen Elizabeth II was crowned on a rainy June day in 1953 again, there is no mention in the archives. However, Judith Dickens once

recollected that she had a terrible cold that day so lay on the sofa and listened to it while her future husband Jim was sitting his finals at Birmingham University. Jim went on to become Headteacher at the Sir Gilbert Claughton School in Dudley. He and Judith were lifelong members of Bethel and held in very high esteem in Lye and Wollescote for their selfless service and dedication to the local community.

Didn't we have a lovely time the day we went to.... Rhyl, Weston, Southport, Trentham Gardens, Alton Towers! Bethel day trips have always been the focus of much excitement, from the 1920's when a charabanc would be hired, to the 1930's when a Midland Red

Omnibus was the transport of choice succeeded by the more luxurious coaches we use nowadays. In Summer 1947 the children were treated to a 'trip by charabanc to Hartlebury Common', they had a good time but were disappointed by the lack of a shop where they could spend their saved half pennies on 'Ambrose' (a popular confection of the time) so the pocket money had to return home with the children! That year the ladies



too, enjoyed an outing on 1st July to the Cotswolds calling at Stratford upon Avon before arriving at Bourton on the Water where they visited the model village. Then on to Evesham where tea was served and after a short stay at Worcester, home was reached at 10.30. The Bethel Day trip has continued through the decades with Llandudno being a popular destination in recent years - indeed this years trip is again to Llandudno, on Friday 25th August. Let us know if you would like to join us!

Bethel Chapel was built in 1900 by poor local people who, because of their faith had a calling to serve the surrounding community 'A stronghold of nonconformity' is how the Stourbridge Gazette described Bethel Chapel in the summer of 1931. Bethel was the first

Nonconformist church to host the Lye and Wollescote Urban District Council Civic Sunday Service. It was deemed a great honour, of which Bethel was justly very proud. The gazette went on to commend the way Bethel identified itself 'with the community life within the area' and praised the 'extent of the sacrifices which have ungrudgingly been made by a poor people who held a great love for their church.'



thrown at him.

Summer is synonymous with the Fayre in Bethel speak, or the Bazaar as it was formerly known. In Summer 1991 it was publicised as a Strawberry Fayre but unfortunately that year strawberries were scarce due to poor weather conditions, leaving chapel facing the possibility of a strawberry fayre without strawberries but with lots of rain.

God did not let us down; a strawberry farm was found which picked and packed the strawberries for us, the rain held off and the princely sum of £1,516.32 was raised on the day.


Staying with the 1990's. one wet Friday afternoon in June 1992 the Pathfinders held a sponsored bounce as a pre-Fayre fundraiser with John Weston very kindly fetching the state-of-the-art Bouncing Activity Castle for the participants. The rain came down, the castle went up and the children went up and down! For £5 sponsorship they could bounce to their hearts content on the multi roomed wonder, or fifty pence would buy you a single go. Adults too, managed to fit in their own bouncy session. For those with any stomach left a tuck shop was available too. A good time was had by all and around £400 was raised towards the Fayre total. The fayre day itself was great success too, fabulous weather prompted Glenda to describe the day as 'fun in the Sun with the Son' although it was a bit of a wash out of a day for Steve Bloomer who had spent the morning washing cars and the afternoon having wet sponges

Because we are a fully independent church, we have to raise one hundred per cent of our funds to operate all of the community facilities we offer and maintain the buildings. Fundraising for a building may seem unglamourous but I would strongly argue that the value of the chapel to the area is priceless. As with any church it is one of the few large spaces available to a local community that is not under local authority control, therefore, has flexibility as to how the space can be used to serve the community. Since this current building opened in 1900, Bethel has served the community as a school dinner hall, a firewatchers station, a local concert venue, a social and sports club, a men's club during the 1930's depression, children's holiday clubs and polling station to name but a few. All these things have been available to the entire community regardless of whether they have any faith or non. Secondly, a church building is a footprint on the landscape, a beacon where people can head to when they need help or comfort. The chapel has extended Jesus' hospitality to those knocking the door in desperation, those popping in for a chat because they just want to see a cheerful face and have some company and a myriad of other reasons in between.

If you can, please do come and join us on Saturday 1st July for this year's Summer Fayre, it is always a fabulous community day. Yes, bag a bargain because there will be plenty to be had, but most importantly come because you are welcome. You won't be disappointed.

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Thank You to Church from an old Icebreaker

When I open the news sheet to read and pray through, I am amazed at what God is doing through Bethel in our community. The outreach work to people of all ages is truly inspiring and it is a privilege to be able to call Bethel my "home church."

I became a Christian when I was 13 because my friend, Samantha Harvey, invited me to come and join the youth group, Icebreakers. I got to hear that God loved and wanted a relationship with me and I wouldn't be where I am in my faith if it wasn't for that initial invitation. The investment in time made through my youth

worker, Sandra Bloomer, and others made sure that young people like me, got to hear about Jesus and make a decision to follow Him for themselves.

Today we have many adults in church who are committed to serving children and young people through groups like Icebreakers (Friday night and Sunday morning), Pathfinders, One Way, Little Lambs and Little Acorns as well as the many special events like pottery painting, parties, social activities and prize giving that take place so that children and young people have fun, feel valued and hear the gospel in a relevant way.

A desire to see other young people reached led me to work for a national Christian Charity - Youth for Christ, where I have been for nearly 20 years. Youth for Christ seek to "take the Good News relevantly to every young person in Britain". That is a big aim but after more than 75 years of service Youth for Christ is still going and we currently have around 60 centres and projects serving young people in their local communities through the support of local churches.

I serve the Youth for Christ team at a national level helping to support these ministries. For many young people "Youth for Christ" is their initial engagement with the local church. It is through going into schools, running youth clubs, running detached youth work in parks and other locations and much more that young people, are hearing about Jesus.

Youth for Christ sent out a recent appeal where we shared how youth workers in one of our local projects set up a foodbank as young people were coming along to a group hungry. The young people needed practical support and it was an opportunity to show God's love by providing them with food. It also highlights some of the growing challenges in this country around the cost of living and choices some families are facing. Here at Bethel we are used to providing practical support for

example "Feel Good Friday" now provides a safe warm place for people to come and socialise. Youth for Christ are doing much the same.

We are in a challenging season as a nation financially. Bethel needs our support and all of us are feeling the impact of the increase in living costs. But I truly believe that God's resources don't run out, he simply invites us to partner with Him every day using what we have and I know that at Bethel we do.

Myself and the Youth for Christ team also need your help. Like many other charities, we have been impacted by a drop in giving following the Covid pandemic. I have a team of supporters who support me prayerfully and financially in my work, many of whom are from Bethel. I am so grateful for your generosity enabling me to do what I do but I need to honestly say at present Youth for Christ need an immediate increase in support for our work.

Prayer underpins everything so please would you pray for children and young people - for those in your own lives, here at Bethel, in our nation and the work of Youth for Christ. course Chloe fitted the bill perfectly! She built such wonderful relationships


with all the children and parents that she has worked with over the years and showed such confidence and skill in her role that she was promoted to Senior Practitioner in January 2022.
