

Christmas always has lots of events round it, and we were no different at Bethel last year - there was a lovely Christmas Evening with Maggie O'Hara, Little Lambs help their Nativity is Church, and Jorja replaced me to play, and a resounding success she was. Choral Society sang the cantata Christ is Born, and again, though I may be a bit



biased, it was splendid. Then, on Christmas Eve, we gathered on the Bethel lawn to simply sing carols with Santa.

Then came Mothering Sunday, and my eldest God-daughter, Sarah, bought me a book called "Happy Mother's Day from the Crayons." With some thinking outside the box, I managed to cobble together a Mothering Sunday preach called,

So, Bethel has been here for over 125 years, and until the Rapture comes and maybe after, our doors will always be open as a place of worship to our wonderful God. 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# I am not leaving Bethel!!

Now then, let's set the record straight - I, Pastor Jill Berry, am NOT leaving Bethel. I preached a message on the first Sunday in January - Covenant Sunday - entitled just that - "I am not leaving Bethel." People just don't listen!!! The amount of times since then, random people who don't even come to Bethel on Sundays have said, "Oh, I heard you've left Bethel", or "Why are you leaving Bethel after all these years?" Must I say it again? I AM NOT LEAVING BETHEL.

My preach was trying to begin a pathway of no fixed length, where I would pass on the baton of many things with which I'm involved at Bethel, so that when the time is right, I can retire from full time Pastoring. I will ALWAYS be a Pastor at Bethel, but I won't always be the only Pastor. I'm 65 years old - not old I know - but I've poured my heart and soul into everything I've done in life, and working 100 hours a week for so many years, then reduced to 80, and now it's about 60, has taken it's toll. I don't regret a single minute of the hours and work I've done - I love serving God - I truly love it, and that will never change until that wonderful day comes and I hear Him call my name for me to go Home.

So, to help Bethel (and me) transition through these changes, God has called three more people to serve Him at Bethel alongside me - Jane, Jo, and Jo. You'll see and read their stories of introduction on the next couple of pages. They are absolutely

brilliant Pastors - and they already can give so much more time than I can to the Pastoral Care side of ministry - they are all three retired, and I still work more than full time to pay my bills! I am a volunteer at Bethel, and have been for over two years now, so I have to be self-



employed to earn my keep. You'll read about what they do and their giftings over the page, but suffice it for me to say, they are God-sent and like me, in a different way, are a huge part of Bethel's future.

There are some aspects of Pastoring (and I've been full time and then some for 35 years) that are really exhausting, physically taxing and increasingly challenging in our changing world. Looking after people has never been more spiritually, emotionally, relationally and intellectually demanding. In all of our lives, and this has been creeping up on me, we hear ourselves saying, "I'm not as young as I used to be." We all have to accept that, and fight against it as much as we wish, aging

limits stamina, and there's an emotional weariness that comes after decades of fighting Satan and the world, and sometimes, even Christians!!

I am trying to walk the road towards retiring from full-time Pastoring - passing on the batons of full-time Pastor, worship leader and preacher - and I'm passing on those batons to those who will continue in those roles, working together with me. I AM NOT LEAVING BETHEL - I am simply sharing out some of my roles, changing my focus from doing it all myself, to assisting others to find their giftings as they serve God at Bethel too.

Change, although we fight against it, is not always bad - new is not always bad, just different, and as we transition to a new place in Bethel's journey of preaching the Gospel, God will help us accommodate those changes. Bethel's future is as safe as it's past, because it's all about God. All we have to do is walk in His ways - step up, stand up and move into whatever He has for us, not letting someone else take the strain or the pain, but gathering to be part of God's wonderful work here at Bethel.

This is a joyful time here at Bethel - God has a new thing planned for us, and that includes me, and you too. I don't know what my retirement will look like, and I certainly don't know when it will all fall into place, but I do know that "Thy will be done, on earth as it is in Heaven." God started Bethel with a group of men and women who simply wanted to offer a place of worship to ALL. A place everyone could feel welcome, safe, learning about their faith and the inestimable gift of love from the Father in the person of Jesus. When Jesus knew that His time on earth in His present capacity was coming to a close, He made a plan of empowering those to whom He would pass the baton, and He gave them the Holy Spirit, without whom, the Church could do nothing.

What we are part of right now, is the next chapter in the amazing history of God at work through the Church that meets at Bethel. Do you need it just once more? I

am not leaving Bethel, so please put any incorrect gossip to rest for me! It has been a privilege and honour to serve the Lord here at Bethel, through every way I could. That will never change, but now, I have finally had the brains to share stuff out, take more rest, allow other men and women to step out and flourish in new opportunities. That's what you've got with our three new Pastors. Read their stories next, and as you do, ask God - what does He require of you as you choose to serve Him right where you are.



I'm not leaving Bethel, and until He comes or calls, this is where I'll always be, part of a growing and expanding group of people who are quietly proud to be servants of the Most High God.

## **Bethel Memories**

The Bethel Society Trust deeds which were drawn up in order to complete the purchase of the Hill Street site, before the start of the 1900s, were required to state the denomination of this fledgling Christian community. Being the pioneers they were, the Trustees insisted upon describing Bethel as a community of Christians who refused 'to be designated.' Implicit in this statement is a spirit of openness and willingness to listen to what others have to say about God's word. On 2nd April 2025 it was 125 years since the first services were held at Bethel in its new home in Hill Street. The Bethel Society used to have a wide range of preachers ministering to them. The preachers plan published in The January-April 1930 magazine lists a pool of twenty three preachers, fifteen regulars and another eight 'auxiliaries.' In that pre-motor car owning era it is humbling to note how far preachers were prepared to travel via public transport in order to minister. The Bethel 'regular' preachers included Mr H Willetts from Smethwick who would presumably set out on a Sunday afternoon to be in time for Bethel's 6pm service, whilst Mr S Melson regularly undertook the journey from Oldbury. Attending these engagements was a massive time commitment for these preachers. Such was their enthusiastic devotion to the 'Word' that throughout the decade the 'Preachers' Plan' carries a polite note at the end of the page requesting that preachers for the 6pm service close at 7.30pm.

Bethel always consulted with and worked closely with the other Churches and Chapels in the area but Bethel's independence also enables flexibility; an example of which is the prominent place women have always had in the building and running of the Chapel as far back as 1888. In Spring 1935 Christian Endeavour, which met every Wednesday evening, were pleased to be able to share with readers of the magazine that an outstanding feature of that quarter was the prominent part ladies had taken in the discussions and one in particular had given three very inspiring addresses to the members of Christian Endeavour which they felt had blessed them greatly.

Another 'first' for the ladies happened in Spring 1943 when Miss Hilda Moore was added to the ranks of recipients of World War II 'Comfort Fund' parcels; to qualify one had to be on active service in the armed

forces and have a connection with Bethel. The magazine does not say what Hilda was actually doing at the 'front' but it obviously was something which put her life at risk. The contents of these parcels were paid for by the continuous fundraising efforts of the Comfort Fund Committee. Again we note the hard work of the Bethel ladies from making items for sale such as the 400 'Black Cat' mascots made by Florrie Howles which raised nearly £4, to those who worked tirelessly to make each concert party a resounding success.

In April 1945 the Women's Class were looking forward to attending rallies at neighbouring Churches whilst busily planning for the Bethel rally which was scheduled

for July 1<sup>st</sup>. They were expecting that the sense of inspiration and thanksgiving they normally experienced when the neighbouring Churches united for these occasions would be heightened by the imminently expected V-E Day declaration which would mean World War Two was ended. This year we are about to mark the 80th Anniversary of those celebrations.



For Christians the most holy festival of the year is Easter. The celebration is a roller coaster of emotions, from the happiness of Palm Sunday we go to sadness as we remember Jesus betrayed on Maundy Thursday then crucified on Good Friday. Tradition for many years, indeed since the 1930's, has been for Stainer's Crucifixion to be sung in Bethel on Good Friday evening. The editor of the 1992 magazine, Glenda Harvey states that the choir that particular year provided the *'best shout of 'Crucify' so far!* They earned their tea and hot cross buns that year. This year Good Friday sees the return of a 'newer' piece added to the repertoire, performed by the choir a handful of times since the turn of the millennium, Olivet to Calvary.

Celebrations often include eating as a way of sharing and marking the occasion and Easter at Bethel is no exception as we celebrate Jesus' resurrection and the promise of an eternal home with him in Heaven. In the 1990's the Bethel church family often shared breakfast after Easter morning service. There were competitions for the young and the daft including in 1990 an egg decorating contest, Glenda thought she would romp to victory with her 'Eggwina Currie' but alas it was not to be.



In 1993 we introduced the 'Sonrise' service at Wollescote Park. After being 'rested' for a few years, it has been resurrected again for this year, lead by Jo Chance and with refreshments served from the Sensory Garden. The distress caused by having to arrive at the park at some unearthly

hour is forgotten when we see

the world in the same light as those faithful women who went to tend the body of their Saviour that first Easter morning only to find that he was not there, but had been risen.

As we celebrate God's love this Easter morning in a church awash with bright flowers and filled with joy, let us always remember that the message of Easter is like the beauty of a spring flower, ever welcome, ever fresh and always inspiring.

May you have a Happy Jesus filled Easter.
